In 2024, KAALE decided to expand the scope of the KAALE OGRA to full papers related to adult education that have been accepted for academic conferences, even for conferences other than AAACE.

In 2022, KAALE decided not to select a paper for OGRA because both the Research Committee and all the reviewers unanimously agreed that none of the submissions met the award criteria.

In 2021, KAALE did not issue a call for papers for OGRA because the Adult Education in Global Times (AEGT) 2021 conference proceeded with proposals originally intended for the 2020 conference, which had been postponed to 2021.

Wonsup Chang, Ph.D.



Wonsup Chang, Ph.D., is a professor of human resource development and education of work program at the Department of Education, Yonsei University. He received his Ph.D. in Education at The University of Iowa in 1996 and Master's in Education and Bachelor's in Education from Yonsei University. He worked at Korea Research Institute of Vocational Education and Training from 1997 to 2001, and has been a professor of Education at Yonsei University since 2001. He served as the president of the Korean Society for Human Resource Development and the Adult and Continuing Education of Korea, and is

currently a board member of the CJ Sharing Foundation. He has written numerous publications on the learning and development of workers. His recent research focuses on masterity, which refers to materialistic and formative aspects of contemporary master worker's learning.

Seong Ji Jeong, Ph.D.



Seong Ji Jeong, Ph.D., is an Assistant
Professor of Workforce Education and
Development (WFED) in the Department of
Learning and Performance Systems in the
College of Education at the Pennsylvania
State University. Her research interests
include workforce development program
evaluations, career transitions and

trajectories, and the aging workforce, with an emphasis on labor market outcomes. Particularly, she is interested in investigating organizational and institutional measures to support individuals' smooth career transition from school-to-work, work-to-work, and work-to-retirement. In her research and teaching, she employs a variety of quantitative methods using large-scale survey datasets and state-wide administrative datasets.

Her academic excellence can be found in high-impact peer-reviewed journals such as Longitudinal and Life Course Studies, the Journal of Agricultural Education and Extension, and Korean scholarly journals such as the Quarterly Journal of Labor Policy, Social Welfare Studies, and Career Education Research. Dr. Jeong holds an M.Ed. and a Ph.D. with a major in vocational education and workforce development from Seoul National University, South Korea. Prior to joining the Penn State College of Education faculty, she was a postdoctoral scholar in the Ohio Education Research Center at the John Glenn College of Public Affairs and a lecturer in the Quantitative Research, Evaluation and Measurement Program at the College of Education and Human Ecology at the Qhio State University.

Mee Joo Kim, Ph.D.



Mee Joo (MJ) Kim, Ph.D., is a data analyst at the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) in the Office of Postsecondary Education. Dr. Kim earned her Ph.D. in Educational Policy and Leadership Studies, with a concentration in Higher Education, from the University of Washington in Seattle. She also holds a Master's degree in Educational Psychology from the University of Virginia and a Bachelor's degree in International Relations from Ewha Womans University.

In her current role, Dr. Kim is responsible for managing and collecting large-scale data from 16 southern states. She provides policy analysis and insights to state agencies, helping them develop evidence-based education policies. Her research interests center on state longitudinal data systems, with a focus on enhancing the accessibility and utilization of publicly available data. Dr. Kim is particularly passionate about ensuring that all stakeholders, including policymakers, educators, and the general public, can make data-driven decisions that improve the overall postsecondary education landscape.

Prior to joining SREB, Dr. Kim contributed to numerous research projects on topics ranging from the identity formation of immigrant youth to undergraduate engineering education and the experiences of parenting students in graduate programs.

Ahreum Lim, Ph.D.



Ahreum Lim is a postdoctoral research scholar affiliated with both School for the Future of Innovation in Society (SFIS) and School of Biological and Health System Engineering (SBHSE) at Arizona State University. She holds a Ph.D. in Learning, Leadership and Organization Development from the University of Georgia, Master's in Workforce Development and Vocational Education and Bachelor's in English Education at Seoul National University.

She is interested in innovating socio-material intervention within and beyond formal academic

settings, particularly using feminist-speculative approach and inquiry for cultivating sociotechnical orientation of learners. She is now involved in the NSF Career Award-funded project called "Cultivating Care," where she co-designs and organizes a community of practice with Dr. Emma Frow for bioengineering and biomedical engineering lab leaders. Also, as a research fellow at the Generative Learning and Complexity Laboratory (GLCL) at University of Georgia, she has led and involved in several works that aim to create a generative space of inquiry for speculative reflection into sociotechnical complexity for both engineering and education students. Her work has been published in Reflective Practice, Journal

of Applied Higher Education, and New Horizons in Adult Education and Human Resource Development, with additional manuscripts currently under revision for peer-reviewed journals. Her recent book publication includes contributions to the following works "Reimagining Adult Education as Worldbuilding: Creating Learning Ecologies for Transformation," (co-editor & chapter author), "Rethinking Workplace Learning and Development" (vignette contributor), "Generative knowing: A Nomadic Theory of Adult Learning" (chapter author), and "The Palgrave Handbook of Learning for Transformation" (Preface contributor). Her dissertation project in collaboration with mechanical engineers was presented in International Design Engineering Technical Conference and Computers and Information in Engineering Conference (IDETC/CIE) as well as European Society for Research on the Education of Adults (ESREA) triennial conference. She is an active member in American Education Research Association, American Society of Engineering Education, International Transformative Learning Association and European Society for Research on Education of Adults.

Hyewon Park, Ph.D.



Hyewon Park, Ph.D., is a digital literacy instructor and digital equity researcher at Community Tech Network (CTN) and a Senior Research and Evaluation Specialist at the Social Services Agency of Santa Clara County. She earned her Ph.D. in Lifelong Learning and Adult Education from Pennsylvania State University.

At CTN, Dr. Park leads digital literacy classes, develops curricula, and conducts research and evaluation projects focused on digital learning. In her role at the Social Services Agency of Santa Clara County, she specializes in policy analysis and program evaluations aimed at improving public services.

Dr. Park's overarching research interest lies in using lifelong learning as a means to drive social change. Her areas of expertise include adult learning, digital equity, workforce development, and career development for underrepresented groups. She has presented her work at numerous educational conferences, and her research has been published in leading journals such as Adult Learning, the International Review of Education, and the KEDI Journal of Educational Policy. Dr. Park also serves as a reviewer for Adult Learning, the Journal of Lifelong Education, the Human Resource Development Review, and so on.

Pennsylvania State University

main programs: Diploma Programs (undergraduate), Graduate Certificate Programs, and MA/MEd Programs. PhD students focusing on the field of Adult Learning and Education work with its prestigious faculty members, such as André Mazawi, Alison Taylor, Hongxia Shan, Michelle Stack, Robert Van Wynsberghe, and Jude Walker. As of Summer 2024, there are two Korean PhD students in the EDST: Yeonjoo Kim, and Jiin Yoo. The 13th Researching Work & Learning (RWL) International Conference in Linköping, Sweden: My First Dive into International Conferences

Right after wrapping up my three papers for the Doctoral Comprehensive Examinations—a three-month mental marathon—I had to somehow squeeze the last drops of energy to whip up presentation slides for a conference just five days away. June 2024 was turning out to be the busiest and most daunting month of my budding academic life. With barely any time to rest, I finished the slides, packed, and headed to Linköping, Sweden, for my first international conference. I was set to co-present a research project I'd worked on with my supervisor, Dr. Hongxia Shan, from UBC. Our journey was also exhausting, with a five-hour flight from Vancouver to Toronto, followed by an eight-hour flight to Copenhagen, Denmark, and concluding with a four-hour train ride to our quaint and charming final destination, Linköping.

However, the sense of fatigue dissipated the moment I participated in the

social activity organized the day before the conference by Linköping University. Divided into two groups, we explored the picturesque village of Berg, known for its remarkable lock staircase and the boats running through the canal, as well as Vreta Kloster, a beautiful 12th-century Cistercian nunnery. Such event is rarely offered in international conference, according to my supervisor. The peak of the experience was a visit to a local brewery that featured Belgian-style beer, especially when I discovered that the brewery was founded and the beer brewed by the



renowned scholar in adult education, Dr. Andreas Fejes—who knew academics could brew such fantastic beer?

The Researching Work & Learning (RWL) International Conference

Series is the world's longest, continuously running international research conference series serving the field of workplace learning, initiated in 1999 by researchers at the University of Leeds (UK). As of 2024, it has visited eleven countries in five continents. Our presentation, which took place on the first day of the three-day conference, was nerve-wracking but ultimately a success, thanks to the meticulous preparation guided by my supervisor. This instilled in me the invaluable lesson of what it means to be 'perfectly prepared.' It was also incredibly rewarding to receive feedback, exchange new ideas, and discuss research experiences with others in the field. Meeting esteemed scholars in adult education, whose work I had long admired and which had shaped my academic passion and identity, was thrilling. I was struck by their humility and friendliness, their keen interest in my research, and their offers to send me their latest papers. I

should also mention the pleasure of meeting Dr. Jang (Chang Sung) and attending his presentation.

Over the course of the conference, I gained immense knowledge from the sessions, built a valuable network with numerous scholars and PhD



students through both casual and academic conversations. I must also highlight the conference dinner on the last day at a nearby Swedish restaurant, which beautifully combined great food, scenic views, and a musical performance by a local community group, along with the chance to collectively learn Swedish

dance with endless bumping and laughter. The enjoyable and insightful conversations continued late into the night, blending personal stories with academic discussions. Although this was my first international conference, I honestly wonder if any future conference could surpass this experience. The RWL conference is biennial, and I eagerly anticipate meeting our KAALE members next time!
